The Rabbis on Halakha and History:
Pirke Avot in Context

- I. Historical Background
 - a. chain of transmission, *PA* 1:1
 - b. Hebrew Bible = Torah [Pentateuch], Writings, Prophets
 - c. Written *Torah* vs. Oral *Torah*
 - d. Greek Rule: 332-140 b.c.e.
 - e. *Sanhedrin*: *nasi* + *av bet din* = *zugot* (pairs)
 - f. Pompey conquers, 63 b.c.e.; Temple destroyed in 70 c.e.

 - a. *Shana* = “to repeat by memory”; *Mishna* = “that which is memorized”

- V. The Hillelization of Judaism and its implications
“The words of both schools are the words of the living God but the law follows the rulings of the School of Hillel because the Hillelites were gentle and modest, and studied both their own opinions and the opinions of the other schools, and humbly mentioned the words of the other schools before their own.” *Babylonian Talmud* (Erubin 13b)
